A Carrot, an Egg, and a Cup of Coffee.

When the hour is the darkest and trials are at their greatest, do you elevate yourself to another level? How do you handle adversity?

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

A True New Year Story

Back in the 1980's & 90's, I did voluntary work for the homeless through St. Thomas' Church in Corstorphine and Edinburgh City Mission. This particular year was the first year of an interdenominational scheme run by volunteers from Edinburgh's churches to take all the homeless off the streets over Christmas and New Year and feed them and shelter them in Church Halls and Church Crypts.

Being Scotland, you will not be surprised that the scheme was struggling to find volunteers to cover overnight on New Year's Eve. I was one of those able to do it along with one professional and, by God's good grace, two other volunteers, a lady Pediatric Doctor and a Warden from my Church who was a Detective Chief Inspector.

By 2 o'clock in the morning we had settled some 30 or so customers down for the night and were talking quietly to a couple of diehards who couldn't sleep. Meanwhile we were concerned about getting ourselves home when we were due to finish our stint at about 0830, as it was snowing heavily and there was already about six inches of

snow on the ground (the point at which Edinburgh traditionally took its Buses off the roads).

Suddenly the doorbell rang. We opened the door to find a taxi driver with a man cradled in his arms whom he had found lying in the snow and who was in a very poor way. The taxi driver knew of what we were doing and had picked him up and brought him to us as the nearest place he thought of that might be able to help him.

The Doctor immediately examined him and realised that not only was he suffering from serious hypothermia (we subsequently learnt that had he lain in the snow for another 2 hours he would almost certainly have died) but he also had serious trench foot. To me fell the task of cutting his boots off – something I will never forget!

At this juncture we had planned to arrange to have him transferred by Ambulance to A&E at Edinburgh Royal Infirmary. We learned from him, however, that he was homeless and had taken himself for treatment there earlier in the day only for Security to eject him because he had been disorderly and abusive about his wait to be seen and smelt terribly, such that other patients had complained. We also then found out that conditions were stretching the Ambulance service to the limit (they reckoned on at least a 30 minute delay) and that there had been a major accident and the A&E Department was on 4 hours waiting time!

Knowing that the Western General Hospital had a 24 hour pharmacy the Doctor then phoned and discovered, miraculously, that the duty pharmacist was not only a personal friend, but in the circumstances and against the rules was also prepared to provide her with the urgently needed medicines for treatment. At this point matters took a slightly surreal turn with the DCI, a police trained driver, driving our soup run van, which had probably never been above 30mph in its life, across the city in the snow at speeds up to 55mph to collect the

medication (he later said if he had got stopped by his colleagues for speeding he would have pulled rank!)

Between us we managed to treat this man, shower and clean him, get him some sleep, change his clothes, feed him and transfer him by Ambulance to the Royal Infirmary later on New Year's Day. We also managed to secure him a place in a Church run Hostel, having discovered that he had been banned by the Salvation Army for previous violent behaviour, and arranged for him to be helped by Social Services.

And now for the climax:

When I came to leave for Home at about 10:00, I went to say goodbye. I was on the verge of tears when this stranger took my hand and said with the utmost sincerity; "Thank You, God Bless You and may you have a Good New Year".

Be prepared; who knows, but God might use you in this coming year to bring his Love to a total stranger.

Have a Peaceful and Joyful Christmas and a Happy New Year!

The new church building was dedicated in September 1976. To celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the building, the Vestry has suggested that a stained glass window be installed in the last remaining space at the front of the church. A local company was approached to design and install the new window. The design has been approved by the Dioscesan Buildings Committee and will be installed ready for our celebrations on the 5th & 6th September 2026.


It was decided that the congregation and families of past-members be approached to sponsor a pane (it was suggested £10 / pane) and all donors would be recorded for posterity together with any dedication.

For the creation waits with eager longing for the glorious liberty of the children of God. Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your people and kindle in us the fire of your Love.

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






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
